Rochester Urban Fellows 2023 Syllabus

OVERVIEW AND EXPECTATIONS

Purpose: To provide local undergraduates with opportunities to: develop personal and professional skills through a summer fellowship; increase their understanding of urban issues and poverty through faculty-led dialogues and community experiences; and develop an appreciation for cross-cultural issues and urban life by participating in community activities.

Professionalism: You will be held to the highest standards of academic and professional integrity. Fellows are expected to observe all regulations detailed in the University of Rochester's Conduct Standards, Policies, and Procedures, and exemplified in the University's Communal Principles.

Fellowship Expectations: You are an ambassador of the program, the University of Rochester and other area colleges, your host site, and (if applicable) AmeriCorps VISTA. You will be held to the same standards as employees at your host agency and are expected to demonstrate respect for agency staff and become part of their team. Students are expected to follow all agency rules and regulations. Any workplace issues should first be addressed with your host agency.

Attendance: Wednesday sessions begin at <u>9:00 a.m. EST</u>, with a reflection on the past week and announcements. Attendance is mandatory, and Fellows are expected to be on time. If you are late more than twice, a disciplinary meeting will be held. Refer to the disciplinary guide for more information.

Participation: Students are expected to come prepared to demonstrate a conversational knowledge of assigned readings and to offer insights and opinions regarding various urban issues. It is expected that students write **weekly reflections** via Blackboard (due **Sundays at 11:59PM EST**) focused on their experiences and/or accomplishments and challenges at their service site. These reflections are private.

Readings: Course readings will be accessible on Blackboard. Have the readings available to you!

End-of-Summer Symposium: During the final weeks of the program, students will prepare a **10-minute presentation** about their Urban Fellows experience. One Fellow will be selected to present about their experience at our closing celebrations.

Reporting: Students are required to report both quantitative and qualitative data on the work they do at their host sites during their service. Reporting forms should be filled out by **11:59 PM EST on Sunday**, **July 16**, at which time program staff will review them. Fellows **should continue to add to their reporting document** as necessary after July 16, but reporting must be completed accurately and on time in order to receive the end of service education award.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

As a result of participation in the Urban Fellows Program, we anticipate that students will:

- Participate in service/volunteer activities (as feasible)

- Employ professionalism, including attire, punctuality, and accountability
- Apply adaptability/creativity when faced with project-related or community-centered challenges

Intrapersonal Competency

- Demonstrate self-motivation when accomplishing tasks
- Demonstrate cultural awareness of self
- Articulate personal strengths, challenges, and experiences

Interpersonal and Cultural Competency

- Demonstrate cultural humility when interacting with diverse stakeholders
- Apply teamwork/collaboration when working with diverse stakeholders

Cognitive Complexity

- Apply critical thinking when faced with project-related or community-centered challenges
- Apply problem solving when faced with project-related or community-centered challenges
- Implement reflective thinking

Knowledge Acquisition

- Relate theoretic urban issues to personal experiences within Rochester and beyond
- Interpret historic or socioeconomic trends and their impact on policy
- Evaluate social policies and their influence on people

- Develop an increased connection to the Rochester area
- Develop meaningful relationships with community members
- Demonstrate reciprocity with various stakeholders
