May/June

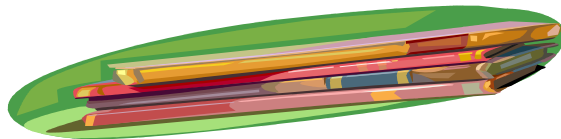
Yello-Oh Girls!: Emerging Voices Explore Culture, Identity and Growing Up (Asian) by Vickie Nam (336 pages)
