What made you select URochester as your university?

As the son of a librarian, I grew up learning that a university is only as strong as its libraries, and the libraries here exemplify that standard. Moreover, the flexibility of the cluster curriculum has also been central to my academic experience, allowing me to pursue and major in a variety of my interests. Overall, the University of Rochester provided me an excellent space to grow and develop as both a student and as a scholar.

What is your favorite piece of URochester history?

One of my favorite pieces of University of Rochester history is the Rossell Hope Robbins Library in Rush Rhees. It houses one of the largest repositories of medieval literature in North America, with works spanning from the fifth to the fifteenth centuries. The collection originated in the 1980s when Rossell Hope Robbins donated his extensive library on the condition that the books remain together. Today, the collection not only preserves manuscripts and scholarship on figures like King Arthur, Beowulf, and Joan of Arc, but also helped pioneer early digital humanities projects like the Camelot Project, which made rare medieval texts accessible online to scholars around the world. That's why I love Robbins Library: one moment you're in Rush Rhees, and the next you're surrounded by centuries-old stories of knights, legends, and medieval worlds.

What has surprised you the most about URochester?

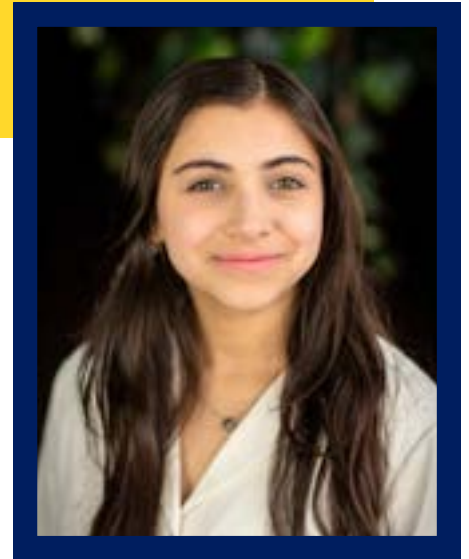
