Why apply for scholarships?

- Scholarships can make the difference between being able to afford going abroad, or not, especially for short-term programs
- Being awarded a scholarship is something to highlight on your résumé
- You may develop better writing skills
- Students who earn scholarships are more likely to be awarded scholarships or fellowships in the future
- It will prepare you to write fellowship applications

Myths about education abroad scholarships...

- They're unattainable
- They'll pay for my airfare
- They'll cover the entire program fee
- I'll receive them in the form of a check
- I have to have a 4.0 GPA
- Scholarships will negatively affect my financial aid
- They're only available if I earn academic credit
- I can't receive more than one scholarship
- Nobody will help me with the application process

Out of pocket expenses

- Airfare
- Books
- Public transportation
- Passports and visas
- Personal travel
- Personal expenses (e.g., toiletries, events, going out)
- Meals (some housing types, e.g. homestay, include 1-3 meals/day. Some programs offer a food stipend)

• => START SAVING your MONEY NOW

Eligibility

- Eligibility can vary by type of scholarship or grant. Here are some considerations:
- Citizenship
- GPA
- Field(s) of study
- Length of study UR aid/scholarships apply to UR semester/academic year programs only
- Language proficiency
- Study abroad location

 International students: plan to spend time researching, using the resources at our website, as there are fewer scholarships for international students



Things to be aware of:

- Deadlines are not flexible
- Do not wait until the last minute to request official transcripts, letters of recommendation, etc.
- Writing essays or personal statements requires time and effort
- Outside scholarships/awards may affect your financial aid package

- Understand the application requirements and complete by the deadline.
- Give yourself plenty of time to prepare the application
- Scholarships are not awarded for poorly-written applications
- Talk to your financial aid counselor about how a scholarship may affect you.

Sources of Scholarships

Program-specific

e.g., CIEE, IES Abroad

Usually available to students of any citizenship

- National or Federal
 - e.g., Boren, Gilman

Usually available to U.S. citizens only

- Clubs or private organizations
 - e.g., Golden Key Honor Society
- Offered by UR
 - e.g., Hajim International Experience Scholarship, Burton for summer foreign language study
 - Usually available to students of any citizenship
- Also consider crowdfunding
 - e.g. <u>GoFundMe</u> or
 - FundMyTravel.com

--Note that funds are considered taxable income

--International students: consult with ISO before undertaking crowdfunding

What about loans, Pell Grant, ...?

Semester study

UR programs: your UR aid and scholarships apply toward your charges (UR tuition, standard housing, CMC box fee)

--UR tuition and CMC box fee if going on an exchange programs

Summer/short-term study

Regular UR aid/scholarships do not apply

•Must be registered for 6 credit hours to be eligible for Pell or federal loans

--The amount of Pell eligibility for the summer will be based on your EFC and it does not impact the amount of Pell they you receive in the fall.

Outside Scholarships

The amount of the outside scholarships received will reduce the work-study and loan awards before reducing university need-based grants. The combination of outside awards and Rochester-packaged awards may not exceed a student's institutional need or cost of attendance.

Types of Scholarships •--Need-based

 Application asks for financial documentation, for example, copy of your FAFSA and confirmation by your Financial Aid Counselor

--Merit-based

 Application may ask for personal statement, letter(s) of recommendation, transcript

It is possible to apply for more than one type of aid/scholarship and to be awarded more than one.

TUTORING AT THE WRITING CENTER

- WHO WE ARE: a diverse group of writers from across the academic disciplines who provide constructive feedback and teach writing skills and processes to enhance every author's voice and purpose.
- **OUR MISSION:** to build a strong community of writers, readers, and researchers, guided by advice from an interdisciplinary faculty committee.

- **TYPES OF TUTORS**: Writing Consultants, Writing Fellows, & Speaking Fellows
- **FROM PROCESS TO POLISHING**: All tutors can help at any stage of the process (from the prompt to polishing).

A TYPICAL APPOINTMENT

Tutoring sessions are based on your goals & questions

Consultants can help with:

- Planning, brainstorming, understanding the prompt
- **Discovery** (e.g., Figuring out what to include/exclude)
- Focus (e.g., What is your purpose? Is this central message getting through clearly?)
- **Cohesion** (e.g., Are there gaps in your narrative? Missing information/connections? Do sentences and paragraphs connect across the text?)
- **Structure** (e.g., Does the text demonstrate reader-based organization? Does it address the prompt?)
- **Polishing** (e.g., Is the text free of errors? Does the style work for this purpose/audience?)

WRITING GROUPS

What is a writing group? Small groups of writers who meet & write together once a week for 2 hours. Each group is led by a Writing Fellow.

Each person:

- Shares their writing goal for that day
- Writes!
- Shares their progress/next steps

What can I work on? Any academic, professional, or creative writing.

Why should I join one? A writing group can provide:

- A regular schedule for writing
- Focused time for writing
- A sense of accountability & community

- Pick a group that fits your schedule
- Your group leader will be in touch with you to confirm your first meeting

Common errors

INCORRECT:

- Clustering
- Combining together
- new country
- new culture
- new language
- Plan on/Planning on
- People/students that
- School

CORRECT:

completing a cluster of courses in ... combining another / different country another / different culture another / different language Plan to / planning to people/students who college or university

DON'T JUST SPELL-CHECK; PROOFREAD YOUR ESSAYS !

Boren Scholarships

- <u>Boren Scholarships</u> are for U.S. citizens who wish to study abroad for a semester, academic year, or (STEM students only) summer, in non-traditional locations.
- Applicants must show dedication to study of critical languages
- Interest in areas of national security
- Longer-term study abroad is preferred
- Special opportunities for <u>ROTC students</u>, e.g., <u>Project Go</u> alumni
- Special opportunities in <u>Africa</u>, <u>India</u>, and <u>Indonesia</u>
- Summer awards for <u>STEM students</u> only; program length of 8 weeks or longer
- Awards up to \$8000 for summer study, \$10000 for semester study
- **One** application deadline per year (UR internal deadline 1/24/20)

Boren Scholarships Eligibility


- U.S. citizen
- Matriculated at time of application and until Scholarship is complete
- Study abroad program must include formal study of a critical language, e.g. Arabic, Swahili, Urdu
- Study outside of North America, Western Europe, Australia, New Zealand.
- Preferred fields of study
- Commitment to government service. Recipients commit to working in the federal government for at least one year after graduation.

Gilman Scholarships

- Regular Gilman Scholarships
- Gilman-McCain Scholarships –
- The Gilman-McCain Scholarship is a congressionally funded initiative of the <u>Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs</u> at the <u>U.S.</u> <u>Department of State</u> and named after the late senator John S. McCain from Arizona.
- The Gilman-McCain Scholarship provides awards of \$5,000 for *child dependents of active duty service members to study or intern abroad on credit-bearing programs. Must be receiving Title IV federal aid.*

"As a first-generation, low-income, minority student, I was convinced going abroad would be impossible. Not only did receiving the Gilman scholarship make my semester in Rome feasible, but it also allowed me to truly thrive during my time in Italy. I was able to travel to different countries and afford my weekly expenses without being burdened by constant financial insecurity."





Gilman Program's Impact

71% would not have been able to study abroad without the Gilman Scholarship

87% were the first in their family to study abroad

15% participated in career oriented experiences





BENJAMIN A. GILMAN INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP

Eligibility

- U.S. citizen
- Undergraduate student
- Federal Pell Grant
- Academic Credit
- Minimum three weeks (21 days)
 OR two weeks (14 days) if at community college
- Studying in a country with an overall Travel Advisory Level 1 or 2


