

Change in process for requesting funding

New student funding application "portal" to help manage some of the requests for supplemental funding. Students will use the portal to apply for funding for various activities, such as attending academic conferences, participating in internships, or hosting events.


Depending on what the funding will be used for, the portal will invite reviewers from College departments to look at the applications. Reviewers will then be able to pledge or decline funding within the portal. They can also see other reviewers, whether they have pledged funding, and how much.

Students will receive a letter indicating the total amount awarded from the College, and I'll work with the appropriate admins and students on the back end to coordinate the actual disbursement of funds.


College Student Diversity Report June 30, 2017

Some next steps

Establish a working group to continue to explore the experiences and academic outcomes (e.g. graduation rates).

The working group would also conduct a review of student services, including the impact of admissions and financial aid practices, on URM, low-income and first generation students.

This group will be led by the Dean for Diversity in AS&E and report regularly to the Dean's Office on the best approaches to support these populations of students.

Some next steps


Continue the analysis and dissemination of Climate Survey data and to deploy the survey every three years.

ECO, HEOP, Kearns and Brady Scholars programs have provided needed support for a substantial number of URM, first-generation, and/or low-income students. The College will continue to pursue the support needed to expand these programs. These services have proven important for improved retention and graduation rates for current program participants.
