Rules of the Game:

The game was simple: 6 rounds, 3 questions per round, and the team wages points before given the question. At the end of the third round, our lovely program assistants quickly graded the questions: o points for a wrong answer, and the points they waged for the correct answer. The question topics were about language, history and geography; when possible, the answer must be specific to the team's representative language.

Some questions were easy, such as "How do you say hello in your team's language?" Others were much harder, like "What is one language option at the Vatican's ATM?" (The answer is Latin.) During the 2 -minute intervals when teams were able to respond, pop hits from languages around the world would play in the background like Russian, Polish and Mandarin.

It was a fun and exciting night for all who participated and we walked away learning a bit more about culture and language.
