IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR FULL-TIME STUDENTS

All records must be submitted in English.

New York State Public Health Law #2165 requires that all full-time and part-time (enrolled for at least six hours per semester, or four hours per quarter) students born on or after January 1, 1957 attending a college or university in New York State must provide the following immunization information. New York State Public Health Law #2167 requires colleges and universities to provide information about meningococcal meningitis (also called meningococcal disease) and vaccine availability to students:

New York State Requirements for FULL-TIME STUDENTS

Measles (Rubeola): Students must submit proof of immunity to measles through one of the following ways:

- Two doses of live measles vaccine¹. The first dose given on or after the student's first birthday and the second on or after 15 months of age and at least 30 days after the first dose, OR
- Serological evidence of immunity through a blood test performed by an approved medical laboratory, OR
- Proof of honorable discharge from the armed services within 10 years from the date of application to the institution. The proof of honorable discharge shall qualify as a certificate enabling the student to attend the institution pending actual receipt of immunization records from the armed services.

Mumps: Students must submit proof of immunity to mumps through one of the following:

- Single dose of live mumps vaccine² given on or after the first birthday, OR
- Serological evidence of mumps immunity through a blood test performed by an approved medical laboratory, OR
- Proof of honorable discharge from the armed services provides temporary certification as described above for measles *Rubella:* Students must submit proof of immunity to rubella through one of the following:
- Single dose of live rubella virus vaccine² given on or after the first birthday, OR
- Serological evidence of rubella antibodies through a blood test performed by an approved medical laboratory, OR
- Proof of honorable discharge from the armed services provides temporary certification as described above for measles.

MMR (measles/mumps/rubella) vaccine may be used to satisfy a single dose of measles/mumps/rubella.¹ Students born prior to January 1, 1957 need not provide proof of immunity for measles, mumps, and rubella; however, we ask that if they recall having had measles, mumps, or rubella to please note that on their form.

<u>Meningococcus</u>: Universities are required by New York State law to distribute information about meningococcal meningitis and vaccine availability to students. You are asked to indicate receipt of this information on the Health History Form and document vaccination date, if already received. Please sign the HHF form to indicate this understanding. At this time, Meningococcus Vaccination is not required.

All immunization dates must be verified by the signature of a health practitioner or as an immunization record submitted by a doctor's office, an institution, or school previously attended by the student. The signature of the certifying physician or school official must appear on all immunization records. Any serological evidence must be verified by including a copy of the laboratory report of said serological evidence (titers).

New York State law mandates that students not in compliance with the requirements 30-45 days after the start of classes are to be withdrawn from school and required to leave campus.

NYS law provides that an exemption may be granted upon receipt of either "a written, signed statement that the student has sincere and genuine religious beliefs which prohibit immunization" or "a written statement from a physician or nurse practitioner specifying the immunizations which may be detrimental to the student's health (or otherwise medically contraindicated) and the length of time they may be detrimental." In case of an outbreak, students who have been granted exemption from immunizations will be treated as susceptible and must either be immunized or barred from campus.

University of Rochester Additional Requirements for FULL-TIME STUDENTS:

<u>Tetanus/Diphtheria</u>: Student must have received Tetanus/Diphtheria (Td), OR Tetanus/Diphtheria/Pertussis (Tdap) vaccine <u>within 9</u> <u>years</u> prior to entering the University.

<u>Polio</u>: All students must have received polio vaccine. Enter the date of last vaccination on the form. Either Oral (OPV) or Intramuscular (IPV) forms of vaccine are acceptable.

<u>Tuberculin Skin Test (PPD):</u> Required within 6 months prior to the start of classes for any student who has lived outside the United States within the past 5 years in a country where tuberculosis is endemic. This includes **ALL COUNTRIES EXCEPT** those listed as having a low incidence of tuberculosis. If PPD test is positive (10mm or over induration) then a chest x-ray must be done and a printed chest x-ray report must be provided with paperwork. **SEE COUNTRIES LIST.**

<u>Covid-19:</u> Students must receive a vaccine—both doses of a two-dose vaccine or the single dose of a one-dose vaccine—approved for use in the U.S. or accepted by the CDC.

¹ The law specifies that only *live* virus measles vaccine is acceptable. Both inactivated and live virus measles vaccine were licensed in 1963. The inactivated (killed) vaccine was withdrawn in 1967. Measles immunizations given after January 1, 1968, constitute acceptable doses of vaccine since all measles vaccine given after that time was live virus vaccine. Immunizations given before 1968 technically meet legal requirements if the medical record clearly indicates that the vaccine was *live* virus vaccine.

² The law specifies that only *live* mumps and *live* rubella vaccine are acceptable. Mumps and rubella immunizations given after January 1, 1969 constitute acceptable doses of vaccine since all mumps and rubella vaccines given after that time were *live* virus vaccine.
